

#### **MAINTENANCE TAKES CENTER STAGE IN 2017**



There is always a need for maintenance on the Foothills Trail simply because it is a 77-mile trail that winds its way through forestland along the edge of the SC / NC mountains. However, the word for the day in 2017 has been **MAINTE-NANCE**, and lots of it!! The fires at Table Rock and Whitewater Falls generated huge needs for repairs, and partnership activities with the U.S. Forest Service, Make-a-Wish, Greenville Natural History Association, and Johnson Controls also added many volunteer hours to the total so far this year.

After the Pinnacle Mountain/ Table Rock fire ended, the portion of the Trail within Table Rock State Park and some of the adjacent lands within the Jocassee Gorges had to be closed until the fire damage could be repaired and the Trail made safe again. FTC volunteers worked with State Park employees to clear the Trail of fallen debris, including one session in almost knee-deep snow on Pinnacle Mountain! In coordination with a Duke Energy crew a number of FTC volunteers also carried in lumber to rebuild/ replace a bridge burned out by the fire.

Although the FTC was not able to directly help with the replacement of the burnedout staircase at Whitewater Falls, the FTC consulted closely with the Nantahala District of the U.S. Forest Service to initially reroute the Trail away from the Whitewater Falls area, and then to get it reopened around and below the falls. A huge workday on April 1, which involved FTC volunteers, as well as participants from Make-a-Wish and the Greenville Natural History Association, made needed repairs, rerouted an eroded portion of the Trail, installed shortcut fences, and rehabbed a rockfall area. This one day alone totaled over 100 volunteer hours!!

# ANNUAL MEETING 2017 HIKES AND OUTINGS!!

### Saturday, continued

#5— **Jumping Off Rock**. This drive leads to one of the most impressive views in all of SC, and fall colors should be rampant in the Jocassee Gorges down below the overlook. Led by **Greg Lucas**, FTC Board member and Jocassee Journal editor, the outing will allow participants to see the length and breadth of Lake Jocassee. Meet at the <u>Pinnacle Pavilion</u> 9:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.

#6—**Raven Cliff Falls**. Join **Dan Whitten**, FTC Board member and Master Naturalist, on this easy-moderate 4.4-mile hike to one of the iconic waterfalls in the upstate. The 400-ft waterfall has several short drops and one long plunge before it disappears into the trees below the overlook platform. Fall colors surrounding the waterfall should make for great photographs ! Bring snacks, lunch, and a drink. A camera is certainly recommended. Meet at <u>Pinnacle Pavilion</u> to carpool to Caesar's Head State Park. 9:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

**#7—Maintenance Hikes**. Help out with upkeep on the Foothills Trail with FTC Board Member **Rocky Nation**, Trail Captain **Jack Hudish**, and others. There may be more than one maintenance hike, so plenty of strong backs are needed! Bring gloves, lunch and plenty to drink. Tools will be provided. #### FEATURED GUEST SPEAKER AT 2017 ANNUAL MEETING MAC STONE

#### ACCLAIMED PHOTOGRAPHER HEADLINES 2017 ANNUAL MEETING

Mac is an acclaimed photographer and natural history communicator. Blending science and



aesthetics, he uses iconic imagery to further conservation goals across the globe. His work has been published widely in BBC, National Geographic, Garden and Gun, World Wildlife Fund and many others. In South Carolina, his aim is to connect the public with the wonders and importance of the Upstate's wild places. He is presently Executive Director of Naturaland Trust, a Greenville-based organization that has worked to preserve special places in the upstate for over 70 years.

Mac Stone is from Gainesville, Florida, and growing up exploring the springs, swamps, and hammocks of North Central Florida, he developed a pas-

sion for photography at a young age. Over the years his camera has carried him to some of the most remote and imperiled areas this side of the globe. For six months, Stone lived in Ecuador during the presidential overthrow of 2005 and worked with Wildlife Conservation Society biologists in the Amazon rainforest. Soon after, he moved to Honduras and lived in a small village along the Cangrejal River. For two years he taught photography to underprivileged youth as a way to raise environmental awareness in the region. Some of the students have gone on to win international acclaim and start up their own eco-tourism businesses. Through photography, Stone strives to start new conversations and expose the dynamic relationship between mankind and the natural world.

Currently, his work focuses on America's swamps in an attempt to change public opinion towards our country's wetlands. After spending five years living and working in the Everglades watershed, he released a coffee table book about the heralded River of Grass. <u>Everglades: America's Wetland</u>, published in October of 2014, has won a silver medal with the Florida Book Awards and is now in its second printing.
